Background of the United States Maritime Service

In 1936 Congress passed the Merchant Marine Act of 1936 which was known as the "Magna Carta" of the Merchant marine. This Act established the United States Maritime Commission, which was charged with the responsibility of seeing that American ships were "manned with a trained and efficient personnel." After considerable study the Maritime Commission proposed a program limited to men who had sea experience, and on June 23, 1938, Congress amended the Merchant Marine Act of 1936 to provide for the Maritime Commission's program. On that day the United States Maritime Service was born. The amendment directed the Commission to establish the U.S. Maritime Service as an organization with the same ranks and rates prescribed for the United States Coast Guard.

To all members of the Alameda Historical Advisory Board,

Regarding the property at 620 Central Ave. in Alameda, CA and upcoming April 1 AHAB meeting: The Alameda Point Collaborative worked to get a city Measure A passed in 2019 which in writing, marketing, and APC director comments called for the reuse of the existing buildings. Reuse was even clearly stated in the GSA/HUD application.

Now, APC is looking to create a circumstance where they can demolish the buildings. The prospect of demolishing the buildings is not what our city had put in front of us and is not what messaging during the campaign espoused. **This change in direction, if allowed to happen, is a wrong against the people of Alameda and the decision AHAB is being asked to make.**

These buildings can only be torn down once - then they are gone, forever. Seems appropriate that part of looking at this issue would be getting unfettered input from city residents. Thus, as a minimum, deny the current request to change the site's Study List designation. The buildings have significance in their own right. But, let APC come back. Suggest APC and their supporters get the backing of Alameda via a new measure if tearing down the buildings is meant to be. Let the voters have transparency and AHAB have wider and more clear input from where those most affected - the city's citizens - really stand.

I have looked into your inquiry and have been informed of the below information.

It is my understanding that Alameda City Measure A (2019) was a City measure seeking voter confirmation of the City Council's earlier legislative decision to amend the City's general plan and zoning designation to allow for private use of the property for the McKay Avenue Wellness Center Project. The measure does not, and indeed could not, limit a property owner's decision on whether to proceed with a specific project. The project applicant, which previously considered demolition of one building and adaptive reuse of the remaining buildings, is now considering whether to engage in some amount of additional demolition. In furtherance of that interest, the applicant has sought approval from the Historical Advisory Board (HAB) to delist the Alameda Federal Center property from the Historical Building Study List before undertaking any demolition. That application is pending before the HAB. As an alternative, the applicant has also submitted an application for a Certificate of Approval as required by the Historical Preservation Ordinance, which will be considered by the HAB at a future hearing date. Neither Measure A nor any other applicable local law compels the applicant to reuse (or demolish) the property at 620 Central Avenue.

Dear Board Members of the City of Alameda Historical Advisory Board:

I am writing to you to express opposition of any efforts to remove the historical designation of the remains of the WWII Merchant Marine training facility in Alameda.

You may ask why a Wisconsin resident would be interested in the fate of a slice of real estate more than half way across the country from his home. Fair enough question!

In WWII, Merchant Mariners came from all corners of the United States of America to train at this former maritime school. These mariners in turn carried their newfound skills across the seas to engage in a global war, delivering the vital supplies necessary to fuel the Allied war machine.

Today, the children, grandchildren, and other descendants of these WWII Merchant Mariners are likewise located all over the country. Their common bond is a mutual interest in preserving history.

While I generally support the need to provide shelter for the homeless and needy, I do not believe such social benefits should come at the expense of destroying history. Other non-historical designated areas exist and may serve such purposes.

1 in 26 U.S. Merchant Mariners who served in WWII were killed. That is NOT a typo. This in fact was the highest per capita casualty ratio of any service branch in the Second World War. Thousands more mariners were injured, hundreds of ships were sunk, and dozens of men (and even one woman) were captured and tortured as POW's. In fact, training facilities such as the former officer's school in Alameda were created to fill the manpower gap. For a while, we were losing men faster than training centers could qualify replacements!

Furthermore, such Merchant Mariners were promised (by none other than F.D.R.) benefits equivalent to the GI Bill. However, this promise died with our great leader, and our mariners would achieve Veterans' status in 1988, and only then after suing the U.S. government. By this time, our WWII Merchant Mariners were at or beyond retirement age, and could not capitalize

on any meaningful benefits that arrived 43 years too late. As you can see, this delicate chapter in history regarding our WWII Merchant Mariners is one which must be preserved.

It should be understood that the war could simply not have been won without the Merchant Marine. Despite tremendous losses, the U.S. Merchant Marine ultimately prevailed thanks to intense shipbuilding programs and dedicated training centers, such as the former site in Alameda. In fact, the U.S. Merchant Marine collectively delivered an average of 8,500 tons of cargo to Allied forces, every hour of every day, during the last year of the war!

I have enclosed some additional information to help support my opinion. Also, I am printing out the names/signatures and comments from a *Change.org* petition which has collected over 600 signatures in under six days, from people who wish to see this former training site preserved.

Following are points of discussion of which to engage Board Members:

•The U.S. Merchant Marines led extraordinary efforts during WWII, supplying crucial supplies to our troops and Allies, risking their lives as the front liners, and assisted in what ultimately resulted in victory. The U.S. Merchant Marines also had the highest casualty rate per capita during WWII.

•The U.S. Merchant Marine Training Officer School in Alameda was a crucial component to their heroic efforts, preparing leaders to strategize and organize troops. The radio operator component of the school was also an important contributor to these efforts.

•The only other U.S. Merchant Marine Officer School at Fort Trumbull, CT does not have the unique character and design as the original buildings in Alameda. The training school at Fort Trumbull repurposed older barracks dating back from the 1800's. The facility in Alameda was intentionally built at Neptune Beach for these WWII efforts. The training facility at Sheepshead's Bay in NY was razed in 1960. This site in Alameda is one of the last remaining remnants of the historical significance of the U.S. Merchant Marine efforts in WWII as well as the Korean War.

•This property should be protected, and the buildings should be repurposed to include an interpretive center, community space, museum, and other historical artifacts from WWII.

•This is an opportunity to preserve and honor the legacy of our veterans and educate the public on the history of the U.S. Merchant Marines and dedicated service in WWII, and to show how Alameda played a part in those important efforts.

•The Historical Advisory Board will be next discussing this issue in May.

History of the property:

1942: A 100-acre site was established as a U.S. Merchant Marine Officer Training School in Alameda, CA that included 25 buildings.

1943-1957: The property served as a U.S. Merchant Marine Officer training school, Radio Operator school, and Korean War training facility. The property became surplus in 1957.

1961: Most of the acres were sold to the State of California. The G.S.A. retained 7.5 acres as the "Alameda Federal Center". The G.S.A. utilized the buildings for U.S.D.A. testing labs and other lab facilities. At this time, the G.S.A. demolished several buildings on the southern parcel.

1978: The City of Alameda established the Historical Advisory Board and listed 620 Central Avenue on the Study List with an "S" (State) designation.

2003: The G.S.A. sought information for inclusion of the federal property on the National Register of Historic Places. The determination resulted in ineligibility for the "N" (National) designation as an analysis determined that much integrity of the site had been lost. (This however, does not preclude the site from remaining on the "S" (State) designation on the local historic registry.) At this time 17 structures remained on the property.

2011: The G.S.A. consolidated use on the 3.65-acres of northern parcel, and placed the southern 4-acre parcel for sale.

2015: East Bay Regional Parks purchased the southern parcel of 3.9 acres for \$2.18 million, and incorporated it into the adjacent parkland.

2016: The U.S.D.A. abandoned use of the property.

2018: The G.S.A. determined the property as "surplus" which made it available to homeless service providers under the McKinney Vento Act. Alameda Point Collective submitted an application with their intention to reuse and repurpose the existing buildings. A.P.C. then petitioned to enter into a lease agreement with the G.S.A. This lease expires 9/2021, unless the G.S.A. determines that A.P.C. satisfies the requirements and financial feasibility of their project to be deeded the property.

2019: The City of Alameda had a special election (Measures A and B) to remove the "G" (Government) overlay on the Central Ave/McKay Avenue property. Measure B was a competing measure for an "Open Space" designation. The election was close, and ultimately the "G" overlay was lifted and A.P.C. moved forward on their plans to propose a county-wide homeless facility. A lawsuit against A.P.C. was brought forward by a local citizens group. It challenged the validity of a lower-level environmental report instead of the higher level C.E.Q.A. mandate. This case was dismissed.

2020: A.P.C. presented one part of their project for approval to the Design Review Board, Planning Board, and then City Council. It stated repurposing of the U.S. Merchant Marine barracks. A second lawsuit was brought forward and is still pending. It challenges that A.P.C. neglected to address the Historical Advisory Board before proceeding to Design Review as the property is on the Historical Advisory Board Study List with an "S" designation.

2021: A.P.C. petitions the Historical Advisory Board to delist the property from the historical designation, and states an intent to demolish all of the remaining 11 structures on the property. City staff from the Planning Board seemingly supported this by characterizing the delisting as merely a "clean up" effort.

**U.S. Maritime Service Officer Training
School
Alameda, California (1943-1954)**

**Background of the United States Maritime
Service**

In 1936 Congress passed the Merchant Marine Act of 1936 which was known as the "Magna Carta" of the Merchant marine. This Act established the United States Maritime Commission, which was charged with the responsibility of seeing that American ships were "manned with a trained and efficient personnel." After considerable study the Maritime Commission proposed a program limited to men who had sea experience, and on June 23, 1938, Congress amended the Merchant Marine Act of 1936 to provide for the Maritime Commission's program. On that day the United States Maritime Service was born. The amendment directed the Commission to establish the U.S. Maritime Service as an organization with the same ranks and rates prescribed for the United States Coast Guard.

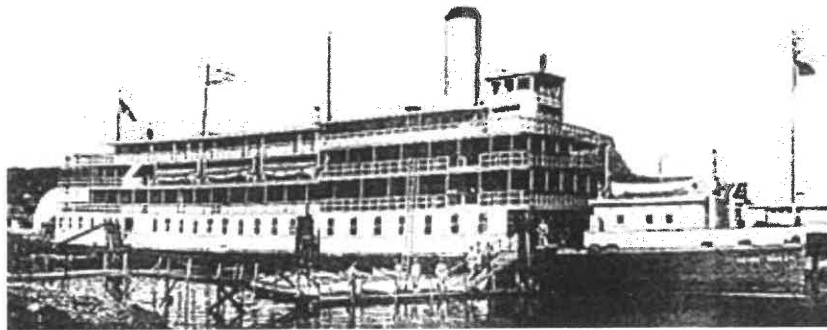
Three weeks after the authorization, the Commission the initial training program started with the acquisition of Hoffman Island in lower New York Bay. Once a quarantine station for immigrants, Hoffman Island served as a Coast Guard training station during World War I.

On September 7, 1938, the first group of trainees arrived. Soon afterward a second station was opened on Government Island, San Francisco Bay, located between Alameda and Oakland [Present day name is Coast Guard Island.]. By the end of the year 389 licensed officers and unlicensed men were in training at both stations. It was anticipated that when full facilities were available, 300 licensed and 3,900 unlicensed personnel would be trained annually. U.S. Coast Guard facilities and personnel administered the 90 day training program for men having at least 2 years' experience at sea. Fort Trumbull, Conn. was opened on January 1, 1939.

Temporary barracks and training center before the school was built was on the Mississippi River Boat, the **Delta Queen**. About 1400 men were stationed on it. Training classes took place in the salon.

The **U.S. Maritime Service Officer School** operated in Alameda from 1943 until its closing in 1954. The Training School was opened on January 29, 1943 and dedicated on July 10, 1943. It was set up to train officers for the **U.S. Merchant Marine**. By August of 1943 nine hundred officers had been trained, and before its first anniversary the base had sent 2,000 officers to sea either as third mates or third assistant engineers.

The minimum requirement of 18 months previous sea experience was later lowered to 14 months. After World War II it was required to have 36 months sea experience before sitting for a license examination. Around 2000 officers a year were trained.



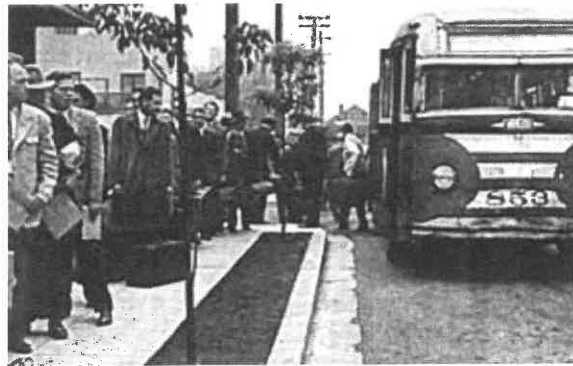
Class of Summer 1942 Torpedo Club

U. S. Maritime Service Officer Training School Alameda, California

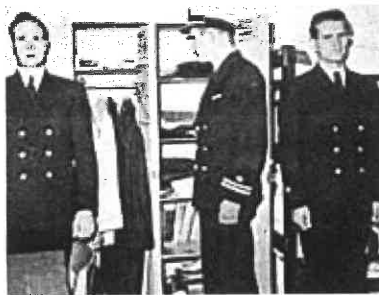
At the gateway to the Pacific, where our merchant fleet heads out for Alaska, Australia, the Marshalls and other island bases "down under," is located one of two schools in this country where Merchant Seamen can come off their ships and earn officers' papers. There are undoubtedly other schools that resemble this particular station in both physical appearance and the men themselves who are ambitious enough to tackle the tough course.



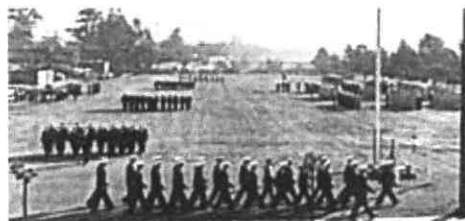

Significant, however, is that fact that here --- the **U. S. Maritime Service Officers School in Alameda, Calif.** --- is the only station on our western coast where a seaman can come ashore, sharpen up his technical knowledge in up-to-the-minute courses, and return to his ship with gold braid on his sleeves and an officer's license in his pocket.

But the training isn't as simple as all that. In fact, it's downright tough. The brevity of the training period, four months, and the amount of material that has to be covered, which is truly tremendous, is an indication of how hard the officer candidates have to work. Graduation from the station is a real achievement. Candidates not only lead a stiff life academically but in every other aspect as well. Discipline is strict and orders are carried out to the letter. Every thing runs like clockwork.

Unlike most officer candidates, these men are "veterans" of this war. They've spent at least 14 months at sea which means most of them have been exposed to enemy attack. Many of them have seen direct action with either enemy submarines or planes. They've been all over the world, carrying supplies to the remote bases on Iceland, Alaska and the pinpoint spots in the Atlantic and Pacific; they've been in on island invasions and took part in the initial attack on North Africa; they were busy ducking shrapnel and firing at Messerschmitts when Sicily and Italy were invaded. Maybe they'll be back at sea when the long awaited second front is opened. All of the men are veterans in the war at sea and they all have one immediate --- and difficult --- goal to reach. That goal is acquiring their officer's papers.

Hero From Alameda

In recognition of the valorous service rendered his country through the rescue of a fellow seaman, **William Morris Thomas Jr.**, 22-year-old assistant engineer from Alameda, Cal., has been depicted upon the current **Collier's magazine** cover. The illustration, executed by C. C. Beall, shows **Thomas**, holder of the Merchant Marine **Distinguished Service Medal** for his gallant deed, in the last stage of saving **William Hutchinson of Portland, Oregon**, from their doomed freighter, on the violent night of November 8, 1942. Although wounded severely during the incident, **Thomas** asked to be returned to active duty immediately upon his recovery. **SF Chronicle**, December 5, 1943.

The training program at **Alameda** is as modern as tomorrow's super liners and complete enough to give the candidate all the confidence he needs for his new position on hoard ship. Since many of the seamen may not have a scholar's background, a remedial program has been included to give them tips on saving time during study periods, how to approach difficult technical problems, how to bracket study periods, and how to avoid examination jitters.

A candidate does not only learn the functional duties of an officer aboard ship but he learns to act as an officer as well. He may lead new men in their first week of indoctrination and orientation, actually helping to give the classification tests and explaining the history, tradition and practices at the school. He may become a section leader and lead his men during reviews. And at all times he is taught to recognize the fact that the word "candidate" will soon be stricken from his title and only the word "officer" will remain. The men are schooled thoroughly and carefully. They are impressed with the fact that a ship's crew needs intelligent leadership, not misdirected authority, in peace time as well as in war.

Training Program at Alameda

The training program itself is no hap-hazard affair. All courses are prepared by instructors --- **Merchant Marine** officers --- who know the needs of students because they've spent a good part of their life on salt water. Course reference work is compiled from practical experience, text books and license examinations and is constantly revised to keep material up-to-date. Audio-sensory aids, training films, charts and records are used profusely. Courses are integrated and coordinated as much as possible; for example, a mathematics class at 0900 might deal with the exact problem to be discussed in steam theory at 1300.

Practical and theoretical aspects of training are also correlated. The engineering building has cutaways and operating boiler units, various engine room pumps, miniature reciprocating engines, lathes, milling machines and shapers, all within a few steps of classroom desk-chairs.

Deck students gain practical knowledge on a bridge fitted out with wheel, magnetic compass, gyro repeater, inter-communication telephone, engine room telegraph, chart tables, chronometers and other navigation instruments. A standard compass and pelorus are on the flying bridge. There are booms, a mast and a cargo hatch. A barrage balloon flies from time ship and blinkers and searchlights are used. **A recently installed Mark I machine gun trainer simulates actual conditions of shooting at enemy aircraft. It is housed in a special building where candidates, wearing polarized goggles, can fire at images of enemy planes on a third dimensional screen.**

A list of subjects as long as your arm greets every officer candidate. If he's able to recover from the initial shock, a Deck student will learn rules of the nautical road, general rules seamanship, cargo handling and convoy procedure, navigation (including piloting,

sailing and celestial navigation, star identification, etc.), mathematics, ship construction, safety requirements, stowage and mensuration, semaphore and gyro-compass, first aid, small boat handling, and water safety.

The Engineer's routine isn't any easier. In basic physics he learns about stresses and strains, gas and steam laws, and kindred subjects. He goes over the construction, operation and maintenance of boilers; he learns about Diesels and reciprocating engines and turbines. He will also have turned to in the machine shop and studied electricity, mechanical drawing and refrigeration.

Not easy, eh? Well every candidate knows it is no "fluff-off" routine or he would have been saved the trouble of his initial enrollment. The wartime need for competent trained officers on merchant ships made it imperative to consolidate and intensify training. And at the end of the four month course, these men are qualified to take their positions as Third Mates or Third Assistant Engineers onboard ship.

Despite the stiff training program, which not only puts a definite tax on the brain but occupies most of the candidate's time, there is a chance for recreation. That is, if his grades are in order and he's indulged in no horseplay. A candidate may join the basketball or baseball team, play on his section's softball club, or participate in other sports. He may just want to browse through the fiction library or he may even take a postman's holiday and go sailing.

Kay Kyser, Band To Appear at Maritime School

Kay Kyser and his Kollege of Musical Knowledge will appear at the **U.S. Maritime Officers' School**, Neptune Beach, on Wednesday. Kyser's troupe will give two shows --- one in the afternoon for station personnel only and another **in the evening which will be broadcast nationally**. It is the third nationally known band to appear at the school. The others were **Tommy Dorsey** and **Horace Heidt** [and his Musical Knights]. *Alameda Times-Star*, June 29, 1943.

Movies are shown in the evenings, twice weekly, and a chance for a chinfest with fellow students is afforded in the coffee bar attached to the canteen.

Merchant Marine Men Will Parade

Two hundred and fifty officer candidates from the **U. S. Maritime Officers' School in Alameda**, and 50 unlicensed men from the **Maritime Service Graduate Station** will parade up Market Street to the Fox Theater at 7:30 this evening, it was announced. The parade will be held in celebration of the opening of "**Action in the North Atlantic**," a motion picture featuring the merchant seamen. **S.F. Chronicle**, June 22, 1943.



Hello MR. BENNY!

Jack Benny, who also plays a violin, will be the guest star in our Shenandoah Show-Hall stage presentation 21 May, at 1600. The droll comedian will be in the bay region for appearances on his regular Sunday evening radio show and at hospitals in this area.

With him from his radio program will be Don Wilson, large and jovial master of ceremonies, and Larry Stevens, singer. The personal appearance of Jack Benny will be only part of our show. Stars appearing at San Francisco theatres and night clubs will also perform.

Captain Edward Macauley, USN (Ret.) Deputy Administrator of the War Shipping Administration, and Commodore Telfair Knight, Commandant of the U.S. Maritime Service and Assistant Administrator for Training, will be guests of honor. Members of this station only will be admitted. [From the Neptune newsletter]

Neptune Beach

The **Alameda** station is situated on the site of a former beach resort and amusement park but not even a suggestion of the pitchmen, the roller coasters, the picnic grounds and sun bathers remains. Nothing is the same --- that is, except for one thing, the Californians say. The weather.

Outdoor training is possible the entire year, except in cases of "unusual dew." Twenty buildings have arisen from the former ghost town that was Neptune Beach. When the school was moved from Government Island not a day of training was lost in the shift. Since the change was made more than 2000 officers have been graduated from the station.



The mascot of the Base was **Blackie**, the dog, who lived nearby. His owner decided to let him live on the base after he crashed through a window to answer a fire alarm. **Blackie** became a fixture on the fire engine when it went out for calls. A commemorative plaque to Blackie is still located near the monument.

Alameda Station Superintendent Commander Malcolm E. Crossman

A seafaring man all of his life. **Commander Crossman** earned his Master's license at the age of 26. He graduated from the training ship Nantucket in 1925 and was named executive officer of California schoolship in 1931. Later he worked ashore supervising the operation, loading, discharging and claim prevention of the fleet of a large shipping company. **Commander Crossman** was called to active duty by the Navy in 1940 and assigned as District Supervisor for Merchant Marine Cadet Training under the Maritime Commission. In August 1942, he became Superintendent of the **Maritime Service Training Station at Hueneme and then Catalina**. In November 1942, he was transferred to a similar post at **Hoffman Island**. He came to **Alameda** as superintendent on January 29, 1944.

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YOU DON'T KNOW ME!

An Appeal to Those Leaders and Legislators Who Labor on Behalf of This Great Nation From Veterans of World War II



Hear our plea and our story for the support of legislation "Honoring WWII Merchant Mariners Act of 2017" – House bill HR.154. We know that you are besieged with many requests for support of other causes. We know you have many issues, which may be seen as a priority. We ask you to give us who remain what was promised or similar. If there are public hearings, we can provide brief testimony for our cause. We will provide information, which will shed new light on our history and contribution during World War II. Moreover, we ask that you favor this aging group of Veterans and let them know that they are not forgotten.

OUR STORY – By Dave Yoho

We are like grains of sand on the vast seashore of life. We are part of a rapidly eroding station of life. We are old and Veterans of World War II.

There were 16 million U.S. service men in uniform – from a population of about 130 million. Our special group represented 250 thousand of those Veterans. Now less than 2500 of us remain.

We were called to service by a great president (Franklin D. Roosevelt), and legislation was enacted for the creation of this special group.

We were issued and required to wear uniforms, trained and marched in a military manner; we had to go through guards to get in to our base and we could not leave without special documentation. We were taught wartime techniques, the use of anti-aircraft guns, and each day our regimentation was supervised in a military manner with penalties for the violation of good conduct rules or military dress.

We were all volunteers; we were present on all five continents on which that war was fought. We were wherever allied fighting forces were called upon, at every invasion, on every sea and ocean.

The coast guard administered our records and training and the U.S. Navy controlled the scheduling, departure and destination for those ships on which we served. In the 7 months, which followed our entry into war, many of us served on ships, which sailed through hostile waters off our eastern seaboard.

From Nova Scotia down to Florida and further, these ships traveled without special armament, guns or ammunition and without convoy – following the routes and going to ports mandated by the U.S. Navy.

In those first 7 months of World War II, 300 ships were sunk and 3000 seaman died right off that eastern coastline of the United States.

In a distant place called Murmansk Russia, American and allied ships were called upon to deliver the goods of war. These ships laden with tanks, trucks, planes, ammunition, fuel, clothing and food, sailed through ice and seas so cold that those who were forced to abandon ship survived for less than 10 minutes before going to their watery grave. No ships were permitted to stop or slow down to rescue survivors. On one occasion, supporting combat ships were withdrawn from Merchant ships and their crews were left to face German ships and submarines, which rapidly diminished their numbers.

The beautiful World War II Memorial in Washington, DC pays tribute to Murmansk as a critical battlefield of that war. Yet, this is but of one of those bloody, life-destroying encounters in which we participated and for which we paid dearly with our lives.

The majority of us were very young when we enlisted; many under the age of 18; some were 16 or 17 years of age. We were trained in a military environment and put on ships at graduation.

When the war ended, we had the highest casualty rate of any of the services. Even then, President Harry Truman implored us to remain in service to bring home the troops from five continents, to transport and bring supplies, machinery and other equipment of peace to the needy world. At war's ending, we were eager to return to our homes and families, yet most of us responded to the call to continually serve our country.

On June 22nd, 1944, President Roosevelt signed into law "The G.I. Bill", which was presented to him by both houses. On that date, and for the record, he stated:

"I trust Congress will soon provide similar opportunities to the members of the Merchant Marines who have risked their lives time and time again during the war for the welfare of their country."

Unfortunately, President Roosevelt died in April of 1945 and his desires and intent were not fulfilled. It took 43 years (till 1988) of struggle through our own medical bills, getting further education or buying a home. These rights were finally given to us in 1988 when we were in our mid 60s; some over 70.

We served as we were called upon to do. We were volunteers who pledged our lives and service for this great country. We gave up our youth and our maturing years. Three and a half percent of us died in that service. Many thousands more carried their injuries both physical and psychological through their post war lives. Ever proud of our country, we stand as able when our national anthem is played and when our flag is presented.

At functions where the military services are honored we applaud as each service hears their music played. Ours (heave ho) is seldom, if ever rendered.

We support our country, yet in our pain and remembrance, we hear that our earnings far exceeded those in the other services, which was not true. A Boatswain mate in the Navy made approximately \$2250 per year and received tax exemption of \$1500. A Merchant Marine equivalent (an able seaman) was paid approximately \$2600 per year all subject to income tax. If perchance, his ship was sunk or he became a prisoner of war, his pay stopped while the Army or Navy veteran received full pay, medical attention for dependents and medical benefits post war. We received \$1.00 per day if taken prisoner and no access to the benefits afforded to Army, Navy, Coast Guard and Marines.

We suffered post war injuries to both mind and body including but not limited to malaria, ulcers, H-Pylori and post-traumatic stress. For 43 years (til 1988) we were denied those health care benefits, which were made available to all other Veterans.

We waited patiently as others affected by World War II were acknowledged and were given both kudos and compensation. We mourn our brother Mariners who have "passed" and their families who cry out for recognition and ask you to support HR.154.

"Do you, -- can you, -- will you -- ever comprehend that we gave up our youth? For many of us, there were no high school graduations, dances, proms, sporting events, meetings at the malt shop... These are things we, consciously or unconsciously, agreed to abandon when we took an oath and did what we were asked to do."

Dave Yoho served on a T/2 tanker during WWII and on two victory ships post-war. He completed high school (G.E.D.) and earned a college degree (night school). During his successful business career, he made over 5000 speeches (every state and 22 foreign countries); appeared in over 100 training movies/videos for Fortune 500 companies. Facts & Fables

Fact: Our war ended 72 years ago. Our life began anew. We licked our wounds. We bound our emotional hurts and moved our lives forward. Today, in our twilight years, we experience the continuing loss of our comrades, the dimming of our senses and the discomfort that comes from disappointment. We've read and heard the rumors and the misinformation. Only we, or those who faced World War II in like circumstances, can cause reflection on these implications. So, we look to you and pray that you will support our plea. Give us hearing and an opportunity to dispel misinformation. Let your actions speak to our plea. Let us be remembered for what we did and how we fulfilled our oath.

Fable: The Merchant Marine was a harbor for those trying to avoid the draft.

Fact: The original wartime draft was for those 18 years or older. Some volunteers might have opted out of the U.S. Army. That was also probably true of some Navy and Coast Guard volunteers. The highest percentage of Maritime service recruits were under 19 years of age. Some were unable to meet the physical requirements of the other services. Some over the age of 35 were draft exempt and still volunteered to do their part. African-American recruits may have opted in because we were the only totally integrated service.

Fable: The Merchant Marine received inordinate benefits when in combat zone.

Fact: There were bonuses if the ship were bombed or sunk and limited bonuses if your ship was in a combat zone. In my earlier example, the coastline of the eastern United States and a vast part of the Pacific Ocean were not considered combat zones (no bonus).

Fable: The Merchant Mariner was well rewarded for all his risk.

Fact: If the ship was sunk, disabled or if a mariner was taken as a prisoner of war (approximately 800 were) their pay stopped and no benefits were extended prior to or during captivity.

Fable: Once in the Merchant Marine, you could no longer be drafted.

Fact: If after a hazardous voyage or otherwise, you waited for another ship for more than 30 days, you could be drafted.

Fable: An injured Merchant Mariner had the right to sue and require the owners of the ship to compensate for medical bills and loss of income.

Fact: In many cases, the ships were owned by the U.S. government. One example would be W.E.T. (War Emergency Tankers) built by the government, sometimes leased but always regulated in terms of usage by the U.S. Navy. The concept of suing for justifiable injuries, lingering diseases or loss of compensation is complicated and largely unmanageable (incongruous).

Fable: Granting Merchant Mariners access to the GI Bill (in 1988) compensated them for any inequities they might have experienced.

Fact: Forty-three years after the war ended the average Merchant Mariner was over 60, sometimes 70 years of age. Any need for a mortgage or college education had long since passed. Merchant Mariners were, and still are in many cases, denied burial in military cemeteries. In many cases, the American Legion and the VFW do not permit membership.

Dear Members of the Alameda Historical Advisory Board:

I am writing to ask that you keep 620 Central Ave. on the Historical Advisory Board "S" Study List. This property has significant historical importance.

The U.S. Merchant Marines led exceptional efforts during WWII, supplying crucial supplies to our troops and Allies, risking their lives on the front lines, and assisting in what ultimately resulted in victory. The U.S. Merchant Marines also had an extraordinarily high casualty rate during WWII.

The U.S. Merchant Marine Training Officer School in Alameda was a crucial part of these heroic efforts, as was the radio operator component of the school. The only other Merchant Marine Training Officer School at Ft. Trumbull does not have the character and design of the buildings in Alameda. The training school at Ft. Trumbull re-purposed older barracks dating from the 1800s. By contrast, the facility in Alameda was built at Neptune Beach specifically for these WWII efforts. The training facility at Sheepshead Bay in New York was razed in 1960. This site in Alameda is one of the last remnants of the history of the U.S. Merchant Marines in WWII, as well as the Korean War.

This property should be protected, and the buildings should be modified to include an interpretive center, community space, and museum to showcase historical artifacts from WWII. This is an opportunity to preserve and honor the legacy of our veterans, and to educate the public on the history of the U.S. Merchant Marines, and their dedicated service in WWII, as well as the ways in which Alameda played a part in those important efforts.

The citizens of Alameda voted in 2019 under Measure A to "reuse" federal surplus buildings -- not to demolish historical properties.

I urge you to keep this property on the Board's "S" Study List. Thank you.

Background of the United States Maritime Service

In 1936 Congress passed the Merchant Marine Act of 1936 which was known as the "Magna Carta" of the Merchant marine. This Act established the United States Maritime Commission, which was charged with the responsibility of seeing that American ships were "manned with a trained and efficient personnel." After considerable study the Maritime Commission proposed a program limited to men who had sea experience, and on June 23, 1938, Congress amended the Merchant Marine Act of 1936 to provide for the Maritime Commission's program. On that day the United States Maritime Service was born. The amendment directed the Commission to establish the U.S. Maritime Service as an organization with the same ranks and rates prescribed for the United States Coast Guard.

Hello Mr Tai, Mr Dong and Mr Levitt,

Thank you for your response. According to the legal definition of what is allowable per the zoning requirements, in order to qualify as a medically related professional business, "Nursing and convalescent homes" and "Rest Homes" must provide **licensed** nursing facilities. APC has submitted documents stating their facility would **NOT** be a licensed skilled nursing facility. Instead, they have stated an intent to provide "Permanent Supportive Housing" which is not permitted under A-P zoning. Please review and advise.

According to the California Advocates for Nursing Home Reform:

"In addition to being licensed, nursing homes that choose to participate in the Medicare and Medi-Cal programs must be certified by the federal government in order to qualify for payments from these programs. Federally certified facilities must meet federal standards as well as the California requirements."

Furthermore, if the intent of the proposal by APC is to house the most "medically complex and psychiatric patients" as stated in their application as well as "hospice" patients as they have publicly stated on numerous occasions, this assumes the residents would need **licensed/skilled nursing** care to adequately address their needs.

Could you also provide clarity into why the ballot measure specifically included language stating "reuse"? It is imperative that ballot measures be written in plain language so that citizens understand what they are voting for. It is also a civil right: <https://www.plainlanguage.gov/law/>

In this case, the ballot measure and supporting arguments state "reuse of federal buildings". Hence, you state, "Neither Measure A nor any other applicable local law compels the applicant to reuse (or demolish) the property, and the measure did not, and indeed could not, limit a property owner's decision on whether to proceed with a specific project," then the language set forth in the ballot measure and arguments was extremely misleading. I respectfully request a full review of the application, current zoning and ask that the City revisit the ballot measure, clarifying the language and offering the citizens an opportunity to vote again.

In response to your question, Measure A sought voter confirmation of the City Council's legislative actions to amend the land use designations for the property. The current land use designations (General Plan Office designation and Administrative-Professional Zoning designation) allow for a broad range of uses, including senior assisted living and supportive services for homeless individuals as proposed by APC. Neither Measure A nor any other applicable local law compels the applicant to reuse (or demolish) the property, and the measure did not, and indeed could not, limit a property owner's decision on whether to proceed with a specific project.

The property is owned by the United States of America (the federal government). In September 2018, the federal government entered into a lease with Alameda Point Collaborative for homeless assistance purposes. The lease is for three years from September 2018 and renewable with mutual consent.

Thank you for your email.

Alameda City Measure A (2019) was a City measure seeking voter confirmation of the City Council’s earlier legislative decision to amend the City’s general plan and zoning designation to allow for

private use of the property for the McKay Avenue Wellness Center Project. The measure does not, and indeed could not, limit a property owner's decision on whether to proceed with a specific project. The project applicant, which previously considered demolition of one building and adaptive reuse of the remaining buildings, is now considering whether to engage in some amount of additional demolition. In furtherance of that interest, the applicant has sought approval from the Historical Advisory Board (HAB) to delist the Alameda Federal Center property from the Historical Building Study List before undertaking any demolition. That application is pending before the HAB. As an alternative, the applicant has also submitted an application for a Certificate of Approval as required by the Historical Preservation Ordinance, which will be considered by the HAB at a future hearing date. Neither Measure A nor any other applicable local law compels the applicant to reuse (or demolish) the property at 620 Central Avenue.

Thank you for your reply. I received the same exact message from Mr Tai yesterday, so it's unclear to me who was the author of this note.

I understand you were not the City Manager at the time the ballot measure was created. However, the language specifically references "reuse of vacant federal buildings" and the ballot arguments further state, "These buildings and their location...".

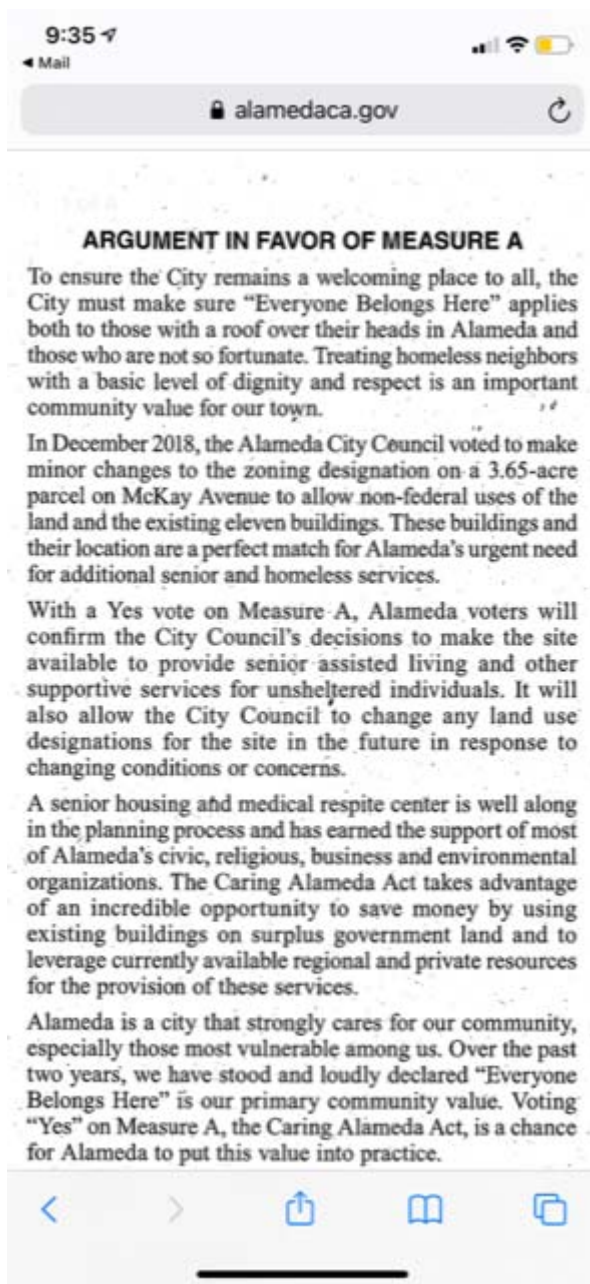

It is my understanding that State law requires that ballot measures are to be written in "plain language" so that the voter understands what the measure is asking to do. In this case, the language specifies "reuse" and it is reiterated in the ballot argument. Furthermore, the applicant for the project proposal held numerous open houses at the federal buildings on McKay stating reuse of those facilities—specifically the military barracks. Voters expected reuse, not demolition.

I kindly suggest this ballot measure be revisited by the voters if the new intent is to demolish the historic military structures. I also ask that as City Manager you please contact HUD, HHS and GSA representatives to understand how the federal property would qualify under the McKinney Vento Act if the buildings were razed. Would that be grounds for disqualifying an applicant? From my understanding, the intent of the McKinney Vento Act is to repurpose suitable and available structures for homeless services, not demolish them entirely.

Would it be possible to make an appointment with you? Are you available sometime at the end of next week?

I have looked into your inquiry and have been informed of the below information.

It is my understanding that Alameda City Measure A (2019) was a City measure seeking voter confirmation of the City Council's earlier legislative decision to amend the City's general plan and zoning designation to allow for private use of the property for the McKay Avenue Wellness Center Project. The measure does not, and indeed could not, limit a property owner's decision on whether to proceed with a specific project. The project applicant, which previously considered demolition of one building and adaptive reuse of the remaining buildings, is now considering whether to engage in some amount of additional demolition. In furtherance of that interest, the applicant has sought approval from the Historical Advisory Board (HAB) to delist the Alameda Federal Center property from the Historical Building Study List before undertaking any demolition. That application is pending before the HAB. As an alternative, the applicant has also submitted an application for a Certificate of Approval as required by the Historical Preservation Ordinance, which will be considered by the HAB at a future hearing date. Neither Measure A nor any other applicable local law compels the applicant to reuse (or demolish) the property at 620 Central Avenue.

I write to advise you, and put the City on notice of, important issues regarding the lease by Alameda Point Collaborative of the federal property located at 620 Central Avenue and the proposed development (<http://caringalameda.org/wp-content/uploads/2019/03/Full-application.pdf>). The City is legally obligated to enforce its rules, regulations and ballot measures. Please ensure that City staff does not facilitate any such demolition or delisting and actively protects the application of the existing zoning as identified below.

I expect that you will take all steps to avoid any passive or intentional malfeasance. I urge and appreciate your diligent efforts in this regard.

As I expect that the City is committed to doing the right thing in a transparent manner, I request notice of all upcoming hearings and pending decisions in enough time so that

meaningful prior input can be provided. I also request notification of all actions pertaining to this property. I appreciate this and thank you in advance.

Please review the following inconsistencies:

1. Alameda Point Collaborative clearly stated in the application to GSA/HUD the intent to reuse existing buildings.

"(C) Supply a detailed description of how acquisition of the property will meet the proposed program's specific needs. This must include:

(1) Any anticipated improvements to the property (e.g. renovations or construction)

The Collaborating Partners are proposing the renovation and reuse of Buildings 1, 2A and 2D comprising a total of 59,167 square feet. These three buildings, which have both lower asbestos remediation costs and larger floor plates, will be retained for adaptive reuse."

2. The Applicant was aware that the property was listed on the Historical Advisory Board "S" Study List, and yet made no mention of this on the application. Furthermore, per municipal code, Alameda Municipal Code 13-21-4 (b), any proposed project listed on the Historical Advisory Board Study List must be first reviewed by that Board before proceeding to Design Review.

3. The Applicant failed to submit accurate information:

"CURRENT CONDITION OF PROPERTY (See P. 112/136)

1. If there are any structures on the property:

a. List the year in which they were built. 1942

b. If the structure is over fifty (50) years old:

i. Is the structure on the National Register of Historic Places? No.

ii. Contact the State Historic Preservation Officer (SHPO) to determine if the proposed use will adversely impact a historic property. Document and provide a copy of any response from the SHPO."

East Bay Regional Park obtained a no adverse impact from SHPO in order to demolish

identical property on the southern part of the site in order to expand park area. We have requested but not yet received a copy of the clearance from SHPO."

Note that not only were there no records submitted from the SHPO, the property is not identical as stated in the application. Furthermore, per the California Register of Historical Resources (Title 14, Chapter 11.5; Section 4853 (3);

"If the results of the survey are five or more years old at the time of nomination, the documentation for a resource or resources, must be updated prior to nomination to ensure the accuracy of the information. The statute creating the California Register requires surveys over five (5) years old to be updated."

Instead, the Applicant ignored this, and sought approval through Design Review. This has led the Applicant to be involved in a pending lawsuit for not adhering to this process which also includes a CEQA mandate.

4. The property is zoned Administrative-Professional which does not allow for "Permanent Supportive Housing" as stated in efforts to secure funding.

"The property is improved with 11 buildings constructed in 1942 as WWII-era training facilities for officers in the U.S. Maritime Service, with a total of 11 buildings comprising 79,880 square feet with 93 parking spaces. The property is zoned APG- Administrative Professional Government, allowing general office development with a government use. The most recent property use was as a laboratory for testing meat and dairy products by the U.S. Department of Agriculture." (G-overlay was removed in Ballot Measure A).

Only "nursing or convalescent home" or "rest home" appears in the language for acceptable use under A-P. The State requires such a facility to be licensed under the California Department of Public Health for providing licensed/skilled nursing. The Applicant has stated it will only seek licensing under the California Department of Social Services, as their intent is to move forward with "Permanent Supportive Housing" and disregard State regulations. The State law is very clear in that convalescent patients who have open wounds, are unable to take their own medication etc. must be cared for under the regulations of the California Department of Public Health. The Applicant has repeatedly stated efforts to provide medical care to a resident population with complex medical and mental issues. Proposing an "unlicensed" facility is a serious concern. - I kindly ask that you please keep 620 Central Ave. on the Historical Advisory Board "S" Study List.
- The property has extraordinary historical significance;
- The U.S. Merchant Marines led exceptional efforts during WWII, supplying crucial supplies to our troops and Allies, risking their lives as the front liners, and assisted in what ultimately resulted in victory. The U.S. Merchant Marines also had the highest casualty rate during WWII.
- The U.S. Merchant Marine Training Officer School in Alameda was a crucial component to their heroic efforts, preparing leaders to strategize and organize crew. •The radio operator component of the school was also an important contributor to these efforts.
- The only other U.S. Merchant Marine Officer School at Fort Trumbull does not have the unique character and design as the original buildings in Alameda. The training school at Fort Trumbull repurposed older barracks dating back from the 1800s. The facility in Alameda was intentionally built at Neptune Beach for these WWII efforts. The training facility at Sheephead's Bay in NY was razed in 1960. This site in Alameda is one the last remaining remnants of the historical significance of the U.S. Merchant Marine efforts in WWII as well as the Korean War.

Dear Board Members,

The USS Hornet Sea, Air & Space Museum strongly objects to the delisting of the Merchant Marine Officer Training Facility at Crab Cove as a historic site and to the proposed complete demolition of the remaining buildings. At least a portion of this site must be preserved as a museum to document this important part of Alameda's participation in the Nation's war effort in the 1940s through the 1950s.

The Merchant Marines provided the vital links to keep supplies moving during the darkest days of WWII. The men who came here for officer training had already spent over a year at sea where they were exposed to enemy attack by submarines and aircraft. Upon completion, these newly minted officers returned to their ships to bravely apply their new skills to help warships like USS *Hornet* win the war.

Physically, the site may appear as a group of old buildings having outlived their usefulness, waiting for demolition to make way for something new. However, the treasure is in how these structures can continue on in a new life to serve as a community space to tell the story of the Merchant Marines and Alameda's role in such a crucial part of America's war efforts. No new construction can ever capture the memories, lessons, and spirit of the Training Facility and those who passed through it as well as the original structures.

As an institution dedicated to historical preservation, we are aware of the critical loss of sites like the Merchant Marine Officer Training Facility. Alameda's rich maritime history, particularly regarding the WWII era, is priceless as well as underrepresented. Please continue to protect this as a historical site with an intent of eventually establishing it as a museum preserving the history of the Merchant Marines' participation in the war.

Dear Members of the Alameda Historical Review Board:

The heroism and sacrifices of the merchant marines in World War 2 and in the Korean War are often overlooked and under-appreciated. More than 215,000 recruits joined the United States Maritime Service during the Second World War, sailing Liberty ships and other vessels essential for transporting troops and supplies for the war effort. Recruits as young as 16 who were too young to join the armed forces, retired seaman and men rejected from the armed services due to medical conditions readily volunteered to serve the war effort by signing up for the Maritime Service. The Merchant Marines were the only racially-integrated service at the time. They sailed in waters that were mined, were frequently torpedoed by German submarines and were attacked by enemy aircraft. They operated anti-aircraft weapons and canons. They are estimated to have suffered the greatest percentage casualty rate of any of the services. Unofficial statistics cite 8,651 casualties at sea while an additional 1,100 died of wounds onshore, 11,000 wounded, 604 taken prisoner and 60 dying in prison camps. In 1945, President Dwight D. Eisenhower proclaimed "The officers and men of the Merchant Marines, by their devotion to duty in the face of enemy action, as well as natural dangers of the sea, have brought us the tools to finish the job. Their contribution to final victory will be long remembered."

Unfortunately, after the war the Merchant Marines became the all-but-forgotten war service and were denied all GI benefits that would have allowed them to rebuild their lives through aid for education, were denied healthcare and medical treatment for their war injuries in the Veterans Administration hospitals and clinics and were denied all other veteran benefits.

At the outbreak of WW2, only 2 maritime officer training schools were established in the entire country, one in Connecticut and the other in Alameda. The Alameda US Maritime Officers Training School was the only one actually built during WW2. The official opening ceremony for the school was broadcast live nationally on the radio and by short-wave radio to the troops overseas. Live national radio broadcasts from the school's auditorium during the war featured entertainers such as the Tommy Dorsey band and Jack Benny. Of the 6,513 officers trained at the Officer school in Alameda, 51 died in the war effort. The Maritime Officers school in Alameda also played a vital role training officers and seamen for the Korean War.

The Alameda Historical Review Board is being asked today to decide whether to repeal the Historical Study List “S” designation which will allow the developer, Mr. Doug Biggs, of Alameda Point Collaborative, to proceed to demolish all of the structures on the 3.65-acre parcel that remains of the former 32-acre site of the Officers school. The Board will review the 1996 report by Page and Turnbull to determine the historical and architectural significance of the site. This 1996 report evaluated a larger 7.6 acre parcel, not the diminished 3.65-acre site under current review. The report makes clear that the site has historical “significance” for World War 2 and quite possibly “exceptional significance” for the Korean War period. It points out that the Engineering building (Building 1) is of paramount historical significance due to its “direct relation to the mission” of preparing maritime officers for the war.

Regarding the architectural importance of the site, the remaining buildings are described in the report as belonging to the Modern Movement/International style with long, horizontal lines, deeply cantilevered roof overhangs and continuous bands of windows. The report states the school “possesses significance for its design as a rare example of an early modern campus design and as an example of a Bay Region style complex and as an exemplification of WW2 planning and design.” The report also points out that “Their lack of ornamentation, monolithic use of materials, considered proportions and horizontal character indicate the presence of design intention inspired by the modern era in which the facility was designed and constructed.”

Other sources discuss the scarcity of building materials and skilled labor due to the pressing needs of the war. During the war, the Maritime Service needed to have buildings constructed quickly and easily by using uncomplicated plans, avoiding unnecessary ornamental embellishments and making substitutions for various scarce materials such as lumber and nails. The visual appearance of the buildings remaining on the 3.65-acre parcel tell this story of the urgency of the rapid construction and the resourcefulness regarding the materials chosen in a time of war. The 1996 reports also states “the buildings of the Federal Center are in remarkably good and updated condition, with few apparent deficiencies.”

The 1996 report recommended against National Register of Historic Places at that time for a “historic district” in large part due to demolitions of earlier buildings on the formerly larger site and against historic designation on the individual buildings which had suffered a loss of integrity “through painting and window replacement”. Other noted modifications were changes to building interiors and to exterior staircases. These, however, are remediable conditions: the buildings can easily be repainted the original color, windows and exterior staircases can be replaced to resemble the originals and to conform to current code requirements. Any adaptive reuse of these buildings would in any event most likely require some additional interior modifications. Many, if not most, buildings considered for potential historic preservation have had at least some architectural modifications over the years. The question should be not whether modifications have occurred but rather if these modifications are relatively easy to remediate to restore the architectural integrity of buildings which are clearly historically significant. In the case of the buildings on the parcel under consideration, it is clearly possible to significantly restore architectural integrity to Buildings 1 and 2.

Specifically regarding the Engineering Building (Building 1), the 1996 report indicates only some of the original windows have been replaced. A movie about the Training School made during the war shows interior shots of the Engineering building with large open, high-ceiling spaces. Much of the subsequent modification and subdivision of the interior into 2 levels can be demolished to restore the building to more closely resemble the original one-story, more-open design.

Building 2D, originally housed the mess hall and galley and served as the hub of the Officers school and housed offices, maintenance shop and boiler room on the first floor and one large, open assembly space with a smaller connecting space for serving food on the second floor. The interior plan of this building does not appear to have been significantly modified. The basic plan of Buildings 2A, 2B and 2C have not been altered.

Alan Tai, of the Alameda Planning Department, informed the Historical Review Board at its March 4, 2021 meeting that the City of Alameda's guidelines focus primarily on whether a building merits the "S" designation based on its physical appearance. He stated the buildings were "not architectural masterpieces" and were "not part of the character of the neighborhood or the street". If the physical appearance is the primary focus in determining S-listing designation, then any modifications to interiors of buildings should be largely irrelevant in the Planning Department's recommendation regarding whether to remove the S designation. The 1996 report's mention of loss of architectural integrity caused by interior modifications should have no bearing on the S designation. Additionally, given that the parcel's buildings pre-date the 1960-1970's construction of the condominium complexes on either side of it or the 1980's-era shopping center across the street from it, they are prominent in the neighborhood because of their WW2-era military design and construction and their Bay Region style.

Unfortunately, there does not appear to have been an effort by the Planning Department to locate documents to understand why the site was originally placed on the study list or any attempt to research the historical significance of the site to Alameda or to the nation. The physical appearance of the facades of the buildings was the primary criterion considered. According to Mr. Tai, there was "nothing unique about the design significance" of the buildings on the parcel. The visual review of the physical appearance of the buildings, a brief excerpt from the 1996 report contained in a 2003 exchange of letters between the federal government and the California Office of Historic Preservation and a judge's decision to uphold the Mitigated Negative Declaration environmental document were sufficient for the Planning Department to make its recommendation for delisting. No attempt was made by the Planning Department to obtain or review the actual 1996 report. Mr. Tai asserted that no additional studies or experts were needed before recommending delisting of the property because the Planning Department relies on the Office of Historic Preservation's analysis which in turn was based on the 1996 report. The California Office of Historic Preservation never visited the site, never did its own independent evaluation and solely based its 2003 recommendation on the 1996 report. The judge in the court case never reviewed any documents regarding the historical significance of the site.

Since the Planning Department used the judge's decision on the Mitigated Negative Declaration as one of the reasons that form the basis of their recommendation for delisting, it would be useful to mention a bit more about this particular judge. This judge was one of the only 4 judges out of almost 1,600 California judges under the jurisdiction of the California Commission on Judicial Performance to have been publicly admonished in 2020 for his conduct in 2 other unrelated cases in which he "displayed a lack of the dispassionate neutrality and the courtesy to others that is expected of judges". He essentially acted as an advocate for one party against the other. As rare and disgraceful as public judicial admonishment is, this was not the first disciplinary action received by this particular judge and clearly marks him as an extreme outlier among judges. Articles regarding his public admonishment appeared in newspapers such as the San Francisco Chronicle and Mercury News.

Summarizing the 3 primary criteria cited for the Planning Board's recommendation for delisting:

1. *Physical appearance.* Where the Planning Department saw "no architectural masterpieces", the Page and Turnbull 1996 report saw that the site "possesses significance for its design as a rare example of an early modern campus design and as an example of a Bay Region style complex and as an exemplification of WW2 planning and design."
2. *The 1996 report.* The Page and Turnbull report was never read by the Planning Department.
3. *The judge's decision.* This judge has been disciplined by the California Commission on Judicial Performance for his actions in multiple cases. He has displayed a lack of "dispassionate neutrality" and has acted as an advocate for one party against the other.

One other assertion made during the Board meeting of March 4, 2021 was that if the buildings were not deemed worthy of preservation when the 1996 report was written, they must therefore have even less historic value now. This assertion ignores the unique documented historical significance of the property and the fact that fewer and fewer of similar WW2-era buildings still exist as the years have gone by. Even the Education building, cited in the 1996 report, as having major historical significance due to its essential connection to the mission of the Officers school has since been demolished. The maritime training facility at Sheepshead's Bay in NY was razed in 1960 to make way for a community college. Other than a museum covering the entire history of the U.S. Maritime Service in King's Point, New York, there does not appear to be anywhere else in the United States a museum dedicated to the heroic service of the merchant marines during WW2 and the Korean War.

In his March 4 presentation to the Historical Review Board, Mr. Biggs pointed out what he claimed were more significant structures now in Crab Cove Regional Park that commemorate the former U.S. Maritime Officers Training School. This suggestion was meant to justify his plan to demolish the remaining buildings on the 3.65-acre parcel. These included a concrete marker to graduates from "this station" who died in WW2 and the former seamanship building. Unfortunately, the concrete marker nowhere mentions the Officers School or the officers who died and it is impossible to know what "this station" refers to as the buildings that once surrounded the marker have long since disappeared and the marker is now surrounded by open space. The marker sits in the middle of a grassy area of the park taken over by geese whose copious droppings keep park visitors far away from it. The former seamanship building is being used for park operations and is fenced off from public access.

The municipal code requires that buildings on the historical study list must first come before the Historical Review Board before going to design review. This was never done. Mr. Biggs won approval for his plan for exterior changes on Building 2 in design review and subsequently at appeals before the Planning Board and the City Council. After spending all of this time and expense obtaining architectural plans and administrative approvals, Mr. Biggs reports that due to the cost of a seismic retrofit and how it would destroy the nature of Building 2, he now wishes to demolish it entirely. It is unclear why this cost and impact of seismic retrofit were not considered earlier in the process before going to design review. He also wishes to demolish Building 1, stating "From Day 1, the intention was to tear down Building 1 for the medical respite program. Go back and look at the campaign materials and it was very clear that building was not staying." In fact these materials show the exact opposite. On the initial application that Mr. Biggs submitted to the federal government in order to obtain the property he wrote: "The Collaborating Partners are proposing the renovation and reuse of Buildings 1, 2A and 2D comprising a total of 59,167 square feet." In his public presentations promoting his project he distributed handouts and showed a slide entitled "Project Site: Proposed Adaptive-Reuse" which showed how Buildings 1 and 2 would each be reused. On the voter information site of the League of Women Voters of Alameda, Mr. Biggs was listed as an official supporter of Measure A which appeared on the ballot in the special election of April, 2019. The League of Women Voters of Alameda's voter information site states "Supporters say ...This Measure takes advantage of an opportunity to save money by using existing buildings on surplus government property". The wording of Measure A specifically states that it will "permit the reuse of vacant federal buildings" and the accompanying supporting argument in the sample ballot distributed to voters states that Measure A "takes advantage of an incredible opportunity to save money by using existing buildings on surplus government land". His caringalameda.org website continues to tout "The surrounding neighborhood will benefit from the transformation of vacant buildings into well-designed, landscaped and attractive facilities." From Mr. Biggs' assertion made at the March 4, 2021 at Historical Review Board Meeting that the plan from Day 1 was to tear down Building 1, and his announcement to tear down Building 2, it is clear that he has lied about his intentions to the federal government, the League of Women Voters of Alameda, the voters of Alameda and now, as well, to the members of this Board.

In considering its decision regarding the S designation of this property, it might be useful to acknowledge the obvious elephant in the room. This decision will be made in a charged political environment and with litigation pending. Starting in late-2018, proponents of the Open Space initiative gathered nearly 7,000 signatures of Alameda voters to qualify the initiative for the next general election ballot in November, 2020. The Open Space

zoning change would allow the current buildings on the 3.65-acre parcel to be reused for uses typically found in parks, such as recreation facilities and museums. In response, in January, 2019, Mr. Biggs wrote a letter to the City Manager documenting how he might lose funding for his proposed project if a vote on the proposed zoning change had to wait until November, 2020. In response the City Council voted to call a snap special election for April, 2019 after adopting its own initiative (Measure A) which would allow Mr. Biggs' a better chance to secure funding. The City Council then labeled the Open Space initiative Measure B. Among those voting for this special election were a councilmember who was also a former board member of Alameda Point Collaborative and who chose not recuse himself and two other councilmembers who have been found by an Alameda County grand jury to have committed malfeasance in office for violating the city charter's prohibition against cronyism and favoritism by exerting political influence in the hiring decision for a new fire chief. The prohibited political influence of these 2 councilmembers forced the City to pay a \$945,000 settlement when it was sued because of their actions.

This special election cost the City of Alameda approximately \$900,000. There would have been only a minimal charge to the city had these initiatives waited until the next general election in November, 2020. Additionally, in the litigation that subsequently ensued, 2 teams of lawyers from international law firms plus the city's own attorneys argued against a single attorney working pro bono who challenged the City's actions on environmental and other procedural grounds. Given the actions of the City Council to call the expensive special election in order to assist Mr. Biggs to obtain funding for his proposed project and the legal time and expense invested by the city attorneys in defending his proposed project, it would be naive to expect the Planning Department to give an analysis regarding the S designation of the property totally divorced from the political wishes and influence of city officials who have been so determined to see Mr. Biggs' project proceed.

On his application to obtain the property from the federal government he was required to confirm "that the property is suitable for the proposed use and/or provide plans for its conversion". Mr. Biggs responded "The property is suitable for the proposed use." If Mr. Biggs now feels the buildings on the federal parcel no longer meet the needs of his proposed project, there are other alternatives. The City of Alameda has solicited bids from commercial developers for an available 32-acre site at Alameda Point. The State has told the City that a new law which took effect in January, 2021 requires the City to first allow affordable-housing developers an opportunity to submit bids. The City Manager confirms there is nothing that would prevent Mr. Biggs from submitting a bid for a portion of that property where his proposed project could be built. With the money he would save by not having to pay for toxics remediation and demolition of the buildings on the McKay Avenue site and with funding he has obtained, he would have enough money to buy a similar or even larger parcel at Alameda Point from which toxics have already been cleared. Other alternative parcels could also be considered. This would eliminate the need to demolish rare, historically-significant buildings that remain among the last-standing vestiges in the entire nation of the U.S. Maritime Service's heroic efforts and sacrifices in WW2 and the Korean War.

At the March 4, 2021 meeting of the Historical Review Board in response to the Board's request, Mr. Biggs agreed to try to obtain the 1996 Page and Turnbull report and he reminded the Board that people were dying on the streets while the Board was considering its decision on his application to remove the S designation from the 3.65-acre parcel. Yet while Mr. Biggs stresses the need for action to get people off the streets immediately, his initial application to the federal government for the property states and that it will take him 36 months to complete his project. The estimated cost will be more than \$400,000 for each small room that will be built. While the State and other California cities are finding ways to quickly and more affordably provide immediately-needed housing by purchasing and converting hotels and other buildings and by building communities of container homes, prefabricated homes and tiny homes, Mr. Biggs' proposed project will take a number of years to build and cost much more than other housing options being created elsewhere. It is both unnecessary and unconscionable to demolish the remaining historic buildings of the U.S. Maritime Officers Training School in Alameda, and further erase the legacy of the Merchant Marines, in order to allow this

politically well-connected developer to put up a purpose-built trophy property that will take years to build when other locations for his project are currently available.

Dear Historical Advisory Board Members,

I am writing in support of preservation of the Federal Property at [620 Central Ave.](#), currently slated to be delisted from the Historical Advisory Board Study List.

The property tells an important Alameda story because during a large portion of the 20th century the island developed as a military town. The structure in question was a Maritime Officers School during the US involvement in WWII, from 1942-1947, and then served as a Maritime Service Training Station during the Korean War through the late 50's. Because most servicemen with personal connections to the place have already passed — and, indeed, many of them did not return from wars — it's important to preserve the building as a testament of history.

Coming from Europe, I find that in this country the history of the Second World War is often neglected. It's actually pretty amazing to me how little interest the US pays to it. For instance, VE Day is not a major holiday.

Moreover, in a region like ours where we don't have very many historic artifacts to begin with, preserving the building offers a rare opportunity to tell the story of Alameda while also highlighting the events crucially important to our nation, and the world as a whole.

I know research is currently being conducted into the architectural significance of the building, although it's going slow because of the pandemic. There is also an application currently submitted to the National Register of Historic Places. I feel that we at least need to pause until historians are able to make a full evaluation of the property because it should have some value for future generations.

Dear Boardmembers:

The Alameda Architectural Preservation Society (AAPS) would like to thank planning staff for arranging preparation of the Memorandum of Opinion by Page and Turnbull for the subject property that updates Page and Turnbull's original 1996 reports. **However, the Memorandum's application of the National and California Registers' integrity standards to a local register inappropriately preempts the HAB's discretion to interpret the Historic Preservation Ordinance's more flexible Historical Monument and Study List eligibility criteria, including the integrity criteria.**

The Memorandum offers the opinion that the buildings on the subject property are not eligible as Alameda Historical Monuments nor for the Study List, primarily due to lack of integrity related to alterations. However, the Memorandum correctly notes on pp. 12-16 that the City's guidance (including presumably the City's Historic Preservation Ordinance, which sets forth the criteria for Historical Monument and Study List eligibility) "does not *clearly state* (emphasis added) criteria for significance or thresholds for integrity necessary for designation of properties as Historical Monuments" and that "in the absence of explicit local guidance" the Memorandum is based on the California and National Register integrity criteria.

Of the buildings on the subject property, Building 1 (Engineering Building) and Building 2 (Mess Hall and Barracks) appear to be the most significant. As described in more detail on pp4-6 of the Memorandum, the exterior alterations to these buildings appear mostly limited to painting the original asbestos shingle siding, replacing the windows, demolition of three of Building 2's six wings with related alterations to the remaining three wings, replacing some exterior stairs and doors and, for Building 1, infill of the dock area, conversion of the original full height clerestory shop space to the current 1 1/2 story configuration, conversion of another shop space to a loading and receiving area and demolition of a boiler room.

Despite these changes, comparison of 1940s photos with the current condition of the buildings indicates that the remaining portions of the buildings retain most of their original appearance and, given their size and proximity, still convey a sense of a large scale complex. In consideration of this, and given the importance of the complex to Alameda's role in World War II and the Korean War and the flexibility of Alameda's Historic Preservation Ordinance's Study List eligibility criteria, **the case can be made that the buildings are still eligible for a purely local historic register such as the Study List and even as part of a Historical Monument**, which could also include the important surviving offsite buildings, such as the Seamanship Building (aka "Boat Building").

We would like to emphasize that the primary issue before the HAB on May 6 is whether the subject buildings are still eligible for the Study List. It is outside the HAB purview to address issues such as the buildings' economic viability or the appropriateness of any facility that might replace them if the buildings are demolished.

Dear Alameda Historical Advisory Board:

We are Alameda Citizens Task Force (ACT), a group of local active concerned citizens, and we are writing to urge you to maintain the historical designation for the parcel at 620 Mackay Avenue.

Below we outline a case for its historical significance and explain why this matter has recently become more urgent.

1) The case for historical significance

Reference is made to the extensively researched 1996 report authored by Page and Turnbull discussed and requested in the HAB March 4 meeting (PT1996). While it is noted that PT1996 deemed the site ineligible for consideration on the National Registry of Historic Places, we respectfully suggest that some significant context was de-emphasized in the report, and additional context has occurred since the report was written. Furthermore, a decision for national eligibility does not automatically dictate a local or state decision. We also believe that Alameda has a unique and rich military history, and we should strive for its preservation based on the important people who trained here and went on to support the heroic efforts that led to victory in WWII.

To recap - the U.S. Maritime Service Officers School at the site (part of the U.S. Merchant Marine - U.S.M.M.), was one of only two locations during WWII where an unlicensed seaman could come ashore and train to become an Officer in an intensive 4-month course. During the Korean War, it was the only such facility. The other WWII site - at Fort Trumbull, CT- has no remaining structures from this period (it is a much older facility and retains other historical aspects). PT1966 doesn't mention this, nor does it mention that the large U.S.M.M. facility in Sheepshead Bay, New York, has been entirely demolished and replaced with a community college. While PT1996 acknowledges how important the U.S.M.M. role was in winning the war, it omits the fact that the U.S.M.M. is understood to have had the highest casualty rate of any branch of service during WWII (1 in 26, vs 1 in 34 Marines, 1 in 48 Army, and 1 in 114 Navy killed or wounded). Thus, the idea that buildings at the 620 McKay location may be some of the last remaining structures

associated with the WWII-era U.S.M.M. - the service branch with the highest casualty rate- seemed to have not been contemplated.

In terms of evolving context, given the recent national and local reckonings of historic racial injustice, the history associated with the structure in its subsequent capacity as field office for the Bureau of Indian Affairs (1968-1980) seems relevant and worthy of some form of commemoration. PT1996 notes a protest (1968), occupation (1970- organized by a leader in the concurrent Alcatraz occupation), and even bombing (1975) of structures at the site. Alameda just renamed a prominent local park for its pre-contact inhabitants (Chochenyo), and it would seem inconsistent to cover up this (however uncomfortable) episode in our history.

Lastly, at the time of the PT1996, there were no definitive plans to develop the Alameda Naval Air Station, which wasn't decommissioned until the following year. Thus, the conversation about where and how to preserve Alameda's important legacy in WWII - in light of inevitable large scale land reuse - hadn't really begun in 1996. A subsequent report from 2003 conducted by the state did not add additional research, and merely cited the 1996 report as a de facto opinion on the McKay site. Similarly, plans for developing Alameda Point were not in place in 2003 either.

We think the site's significance should be revisited, especially given the scarcity of U.S.M.M. symbols nationally, as well as the relatively recent redevelopment of Alameda Point.

2) The case for urgency

As you know, a petitioner in Alameda has requested that you remove the historical designation of the property, in conjunction with the results of a 2019 special election in Alameda (notably, Measure A). In that election, the voters of Alameda were presented with this specific language (emphasis added):

*Shall an ordinance confirming the City Council's actions to permit **reuse** of vacant federal buildings on a 3.65-acre parcel on McKay Avenue and allow for the development of a wellness center for senior assisted living and supportive services for homeless individuals by changing the General Plan designation from "Federal Facilities" to "Office," removing the Government Combining District classification and maintaining the existing zoning district designation, be adopted?*

As became apparent in your March 4 meeting, the petitioner is in fact planning on razing all of the buildings on the site. We think this represents a departure from what the voters entrusted the stakeholders to do, based on the wording of the ballot measure. Furthermore, in the leadup to the 2019 election, the petitioner conducted tours of the site, and outlined a vision for incorporating original structural elements into the design of the wellness center- in the spirit of adaptive reuse. We think the petitioner should sustain this vision and are concerned that the City may not enforce it, particularly given its active role via the Planning process in facilitating the petitioner's requests, as was evident in the March 4 meeting. In fact, we consider this a prime example of why the Historical Advisory Board exists - to prevent quick decisions for convenience which have the (perhaps unintended) effect of erasing history.

Given the increasing importance of preserving the memory of the U.S. Merchant Marine's vital role in WWII and the Korean conflict, and the change in petitioner intent with regards to preserving the physical structures of the site, we strongly urge you to consider maintaining the historical designation for the site. We think an ideal outcome is, should the petitioner proceed with plans to develop a wellness center, they do so by reusing the structures and incorporating commemorative aspects of its history into the design, something that the HAB can assist with, but only if the site's current designation is retained so that the HAB can retain a voice in how it is developed.

Dear members of the HAB and to whom it may concern,

I am writing today to ask that the status of 620 Central Ave remain as in on the historic study list.

The site is one of the last of its type, specific to WWII era Merchant Marine training. Please take some time to look into the references (below) collected by members of our community. Research is underway to discover the architect and other facts that make this site special.

Alameda has a unique history and people have a strong connection to this island. This is evident by the vast support received for the preservation and reuse of this site/building: 1000+ community members including the USS Hornet, the national American Merchant Marine Veterans, Alameda Architectural Preservation Society, Alameda Citizens Task Force, numerous Retired Navy Captains and many others.

I understand that the recent Page and Turnbull report did not evaluate the entire site at 620 Central Ave. which includes two additional buildings on EBParks land. The following statement deserves your consideration, "Viewed as a whole, the site is relatable and retains substantial aspects of historical significance that are worthy of preservation for possible National and California Registers under criteria that includes an association with People and Events in History and Architecture. These people were our community members who sacrificed their lives. These architects went on to influence institutional and residential architecture for decades. These are important aspects of the site that need to be addressed."

Regarding APC's process, it is important to note that the trust of the people of Alameda has been seriously eroded. To recall, APC mis-stated to the voters that the existing buildings at 620 Central were to be reused. Then APC sought design approval from the City Planning Dept., before addressing the building's historical listing. Planning approved the design (requiring a demolition). When asked about this impropriety, the Planning Department/Andrew Thomas, stated that the

decision to demolish was based on "purely financial" reasons. I think the people of Alameda would like to hear these decisions and this rational questioned and deliberated as well.

I am writing to express support for the staff recommendation to delist buildings at 620 Central from the historical buildings study list.

In 2019, the opposition did not want the wellness center project to go forward – they said it was to support our children’s future and they wanted these buildings to be turned into an open space park.

In 2021, the same opposition does not want the project to go forward – they are now saying it is to support our veterans by having these buildings to be preserved as a museum – the very same buildings they wanted to tear down just two years earlier.

The same individuals who were opposed in 2019 are again stirring up opposition by using a different approach to throw what they can and see what sticks. We need to call this for what it is – a stalling tactic to delay-and-kill a project that will save the lives of medically vulnerable individuals experiencing homelessness.

Page & Turnbull was unequivocal with their assessment of the property: “They are not eligible for listing on the National Register, California Register, on the Alameda Historic Monuments List, or on the Study List at any level.” Since 1996, the site has lost too much integrity to be considered historic to anyone – half of the property was transferred to East Bay Regional Parks and they razed the entire lot without a hint of opposition from anyone in 2017. After touring the facility with APC Director Doug Biggs, and reading the Page & Turnbull report, I support the plan to delist the buildings in the project area from the Historical Building Study List. I believe that the Page & Turnbull report, and the 2003 correspondence between the OHP and the SHPO, discusses adequately that these buildings have lost much of their historic integrity, and therefore, would not be going forward as either state or historical resources as buildings. The purpose of the *study* list has been fulfilled, the buildings have been studied, and can be dropped from further study. As a former federal civilian employee, I have stayed in barracks of this era in North Charleston.

The history of the **site itself** seems significant, and I request that the board consider requiring historic interpretive signs or plaques be placed on the site as part of the project, for the Certificate of Approval. The report clearly finds that neither the site as a whole nor individual buildings qualify to be listed on either the federal, state, or city historical lists.

The HAB should accept staff recommendations to delist the site. The transparent opposition to the delisting is not an attempt to preserve any history, it is an attempt to delay the project - this same, shameful group of people has repeatedly shown they will stoop to any level and will tell any lie to create a bad faith bureaucratic delay.

The HAB can not and should not consider the use of the building as a criterion for this decision. Hi Allen,

I noticed that the Alameda Federal Center is on your agenda again for the Historic Advisory Board's May 6 meeting. I just wanted to make sure that you have all the information you need from GSA. Really the only pertinent document we have is the 1996 Page & Turnbull report and the meat of that document is only 2-3 pages long and I believe you now have a copy of it.

The facts as I understand them are:

1. In 1978 Alameda Federal Center was included in Alameda's Historical Buildings Study List. It stated that there was potential historical merit, but further study was required.
2. In 1996 GSA prepared Historic Building Preservation Program (HBPP) documents for the Alameda Federal Center which stated that the site had historical significance, but there had been so many alterations and demolitions over the years that there wasn't much integrity.
3. In 2003 a Section 106 action by GSA determined that the entire Alameda Federal Center was not eligible for the National Register. This determination was based on the 1996 HBPP. SHPO concurred in writing.
4. Based on these results GSA demolished half of the buildings in the remaining complex and transferred the southern portion of the property to the East Bay Regional Park District on 11/9/2015.
5. Federal tenants continued to use the buildings on the northern portion of the property until approx. 2016.
6. Around 2018 the property was leased to Alameda Point Collective (APC), through Health and Human Services, for use under the McKinney Homeless Act. The property was not transferred outright at that time because APC was working on getting full funding for its complete project. APC's most recent plan, which is pending HHS's approval, is to demolish all remaining buildings and construct new facilities: a 50-bed Medical Respite Center; and 100 studio apartments (permanent supportive housing services for homeless seniors).
7. In anticipation of its upcoming project, APC recently requested that it be delisted from the Alameda Historical Buildings Study list. Based on this request, Alameda Historical Advisory Board asked GSA for a copy of the 1996 Building Preservation Plan, which we provided.

Intact, the property would have been eligible as a district for its role as a maritime training facility. However, much of the facility (approx 90 acres originally) was sold off and demolished in the early 1960s, including many of the primary character-defining elements such as the parade ground, indoor swimming pool, seamanship building, night-vision classroom, anti-aircraft building, the mast assembly, the pier, auditorium, etc. Of the buildings on the remaining 7.6 acres that were transferred to GSA in 1961, half of those buildings were subsequently demolished by the time GSA transferred property to the park district in 2015. All that's left now is the Engineering Building, a 1.5 story utility building, and a portion (half of it was demolished to make way for surface parking in 2015) of the Barracks Building, a 2 story former residential building that was converted into offices 50 years ago.

I don't believe that any recent actions warrant re-opening of the federal 106 process. The property was determined not eligible back in 2003 based on its lack of integrity. And after demolition of so many remaining buildings, we know the integrity has not improved. In my professional opinion, this property is not eligible for the National Register.

Hopefully, after you had a chance to visit the property, you were able to determine that the buildings could, indeed, be repurposed as originally asserted by the City of Alameda and APC.

As a licensed General Contractor for 32 years specializing in remodels, I'm always drawn to how a space can be transformed in function to accommodate the homeowners need with the least amount of destruction (land fill waste,etc) and the least amount of disruption (noise, air pollution, etc.) to the occupants and the neighboring community. I'm also drawn to preserving the original era/design, whether I happen to like the style or not.

At the March 4, 2021 HAB meeting, I was saddened after listening to the dismissive and cavalier nature of the applicant and planning department staff in their collective finding of no redeeming value of the buildings. I was surprised at the criteria cited by staff for determining the 'worth' of such buildings being simply the merit of its architectural style. I would have hoped the 'historic use' of these buildings would have some implication and bearing on its suitability for destroying it.

I respectfully request that you please keep the Federal property at 620 Central Ave. site on the HAB "S" Study List for the following reasons:

- This property represents an important part of Alameda City's history as well as California and US history.
- The buildings at this site were used by the US Merchant Marine to train sailors and officers in World War II and the Korean War. These buildings should remain standing as a visual reminder of Alameda's past Naval and Merchant Marine history.
- The US Merchant Marine played a vital role in the US victory in World War II by crewing the ships carrying food, medicine, and vital war supplies to the UK (United Kingdom) and the governments-in-exile residing there.
- At a crucial point in the war, the Nazis decided to force the UK to surrender by flooding the Atlantic with U-boats, which they hoped would sink enough supply ships to literally starve the UK out of the war. Dear HAB Board,

I am writing to ask that you keep the historical property at 620 Central Ave on the historical advisory board study list, and deny APC's request to demolish the buildings. **This WWII era site is historically significant and important to our community and to educate future generations.**

Please consider the following:

- the scarcity of WWII era buildings
- an application has been submitted to National Register that includes all 3 related parcels
- Page and Turnbull does not address significant architects related to the site
- APC and the City of Alameda should request an Adaptive Reuse Feasibility Study instead of a demolition certificate

Please keep in mind that this issue is before you due to the fact that APC has radically changed the scope of their proposed use of this land and they are trying to use the HAB to achieve these new unapproved goals. APC, Allen Tai and the Planning Department he works for have argued the Page and Turnbull assessment that these buildings will not achieve National Historical Registry status is grounds for their demolition. That is ridiculous. These buildings hold an important chapter in our City's history and must be preserved and reused for our Community so they can tell their story and while providing a base for whatever future City uses they may employ.

Recent communication with Page and Turnbull and submitted to the HAB, suggest an evaluation for an "Adaptive Reuse Feasibility Study". Please ask that the City request this important study. This site is over 80 years old and represents a unique part of Alameda's maritime history.

As members of the HAB please also consider these historical facts:

The P&T report also does not mention that this facility is the last remaining site specific to WWII era Merchant Marine training. The other officer training facility at Fort Trumbull, CT has no WWII era buildings remaining, and the Cadet training sites at Sheepshead Bay and Coyote Point, San Mateo were entirely razed. Please don't allow this to happen in Alameda.

The site at Coyote Point was an early design of famed architect Gardner Dailey, and was highlighted in a MOMA exhibit in 1944 as an example of excellence in WWII military design. The Alameda site has similar architectural elements, and research is currently underway to determine who the architect was. Recently discovered architectural drawings confirmed that Joseph Esherick designed an addition to the US Maritime Training School in 1946. He was the famed architect of the Sea Ranch development that inspired generations of future architects.

Also, the recent Page and Turnbull report has significant flaws. Please don't base your decision on this. They only address APC's parcel and did not evaluate the entire listing site 620 Central Ave. which includes two additional buildings on EBParks land. Viewed as a whole, the site is relatable and retains substantial aspects of historical significance that are worthy of preservation for possible National and California Registers under

criteria that includes an association with People and Events in History and Architecture. These people were our community members who sacrificed their lives. These architects went on to influence institutional and residential architecture for decades. These are important aspects of the site that need to be addressed.

Community groups met with the Planning Department recently to ask that they remain neutral and refrain from their aggressive push for demolition, stating also that residents voted for “reuse of buildings” in the 2019 special election. Planning chair Andrew Thomas stated that the decision to move forward with demolition “**was purely financial**”. This is not a good reason to delist a property from the HAB list and ignore the historical events and people that are important to the history of our community.

Supporters for preservation and reuse include over 1000+ community members including the USS Hornet, the national American Merchant Marine Veterans, Alameda Architectural Preservation Society, Alameda Citizens Task Force, numerous Retired Navy Captains, the President as well as the Director of Communications of the Masters, Mates and Pilots, one of the three largest maritime unions, local veterans who trained at the U.S. Maritime Officers school, and the son of the navigation instructor who spent the remainder of his career here.

This community support is what makes the site important—a visual reminder that connects us with people from our past. Please listen to the oral histories of Mariners during their training in WWII and how their experience shaped our victory.

APC has misled the community by stating in their campaign that buildings would be repurposed. Financial reasons are not a good reason to delist and demolish a historic property so a private developer can push their project. There is also a pending court case with APC for not following the proper protocol and going to the HAB Board before moving to Design Review. On their application, director of APC, Doug Biggs, **falsely answered “NO” to the question:** Property on Alameda Historic Buildings Study List. Their petition to delist and demolish are attempts to circumvent procedures in place to preserve and protect historic properties, including the CEQA environmental requirement.

Furthermore, when I attended the tour of the facility last week, members of our group asked to see the interior of the barracks. We were told “it was not on the tour” and there were “no expectations”. This was very disappointing and frankly contrary to what the public was told at the last HAB meeting.

I respectfully ask that you use your authority to preserve these historically significant buildings in our community. We have seen developers come and go throughout the years, destroying historic buildings along the way. Please don’t let that happen here.

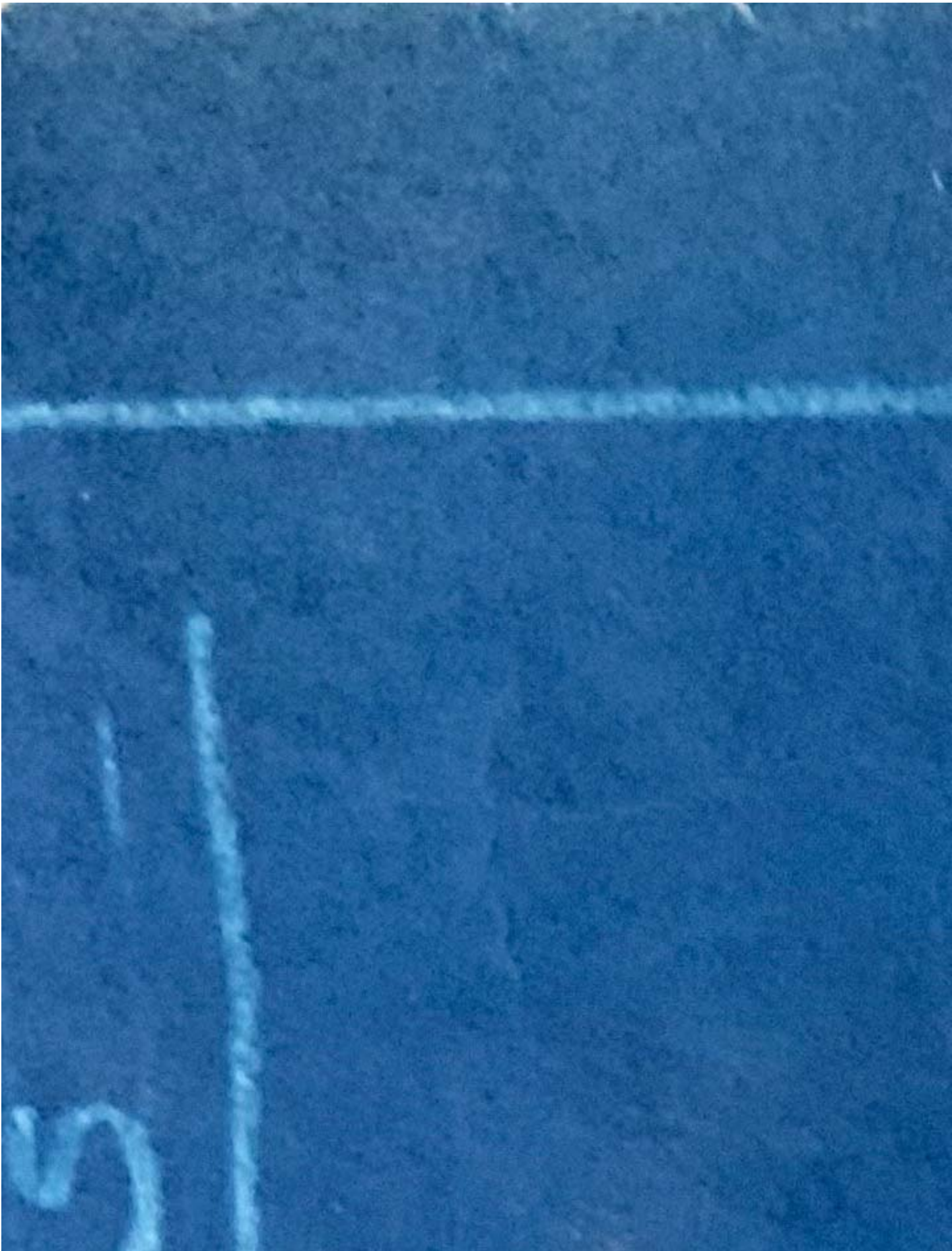

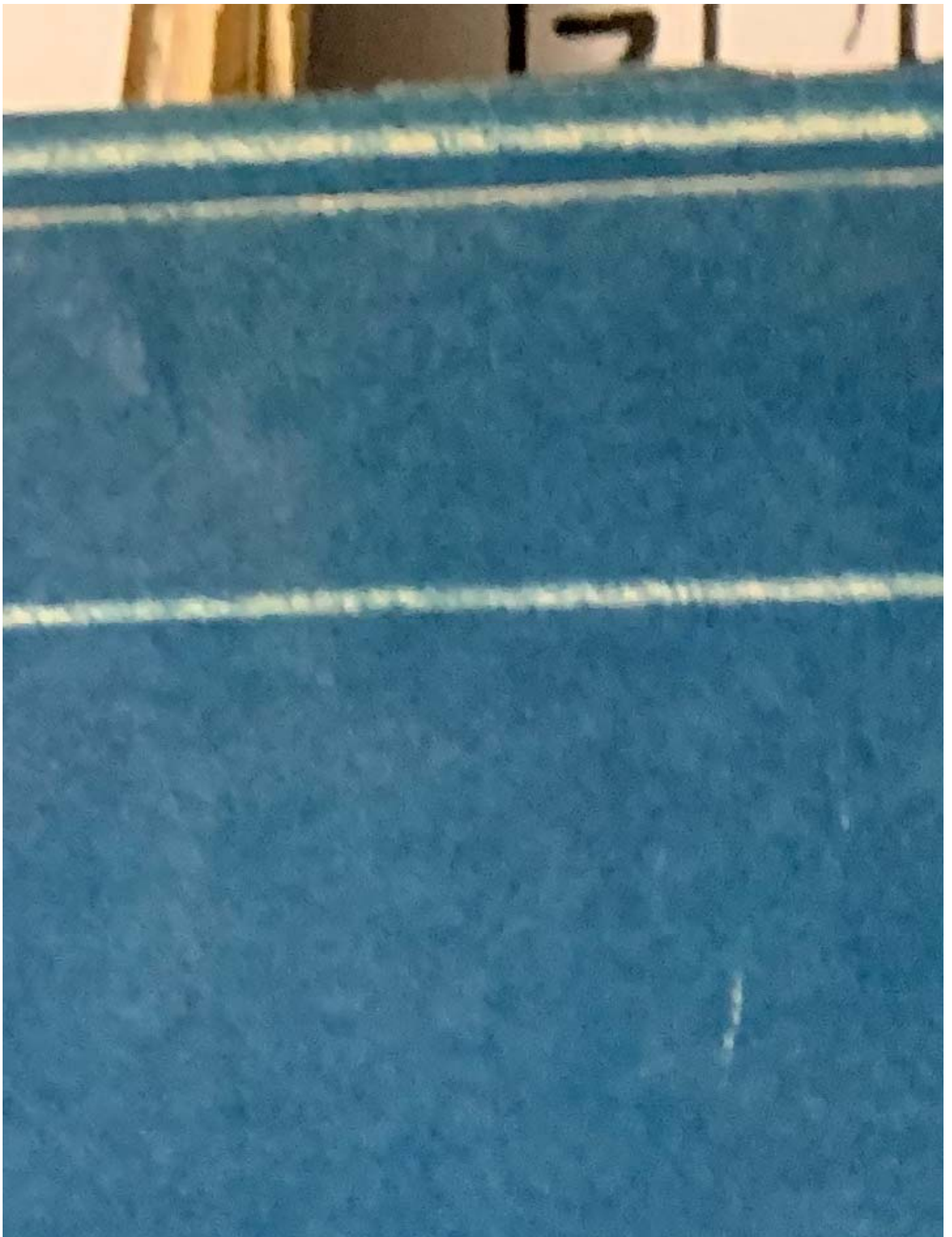
