Thanks to Susan Irvine, a retired career counselor at AHS and now forever friend, Katherine was placed on a rapid-strenuous college track and is the first in her family to graduate from a four-year University. She has her master's in career counseling and refined her coaching craft specializing in working with BIPOC at UC Berkeley. Fast forward, she is now a Diversity and Inclusion professional in the tech industry to bring in, retain, and coach BIPOC. She has a partner who is born and raised in Alameda, is Chamoru-Italian, and together, raise their son. She has a dream goal to be a first-time homeowner in Alameda.

Philly Jones – Philly moved to Alameda over 30 years ago, after growing up in Philadelphia, attending college in Texas and a short stay in Arizona. She met and married a sailor and had a daughter.
