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A reach is a segment of shoreline defined to support adaptation planning.

Primary considerations

- Shoreline conditions
- Watersheds
- Adjacent land uses and jurisdiction boundaries
- Concurrent projects and planning efforts




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7 separate planning efforts

(grey lines)

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Process to co-create draft long-term alternative(s) per reach

- 3 Steering Committee workshops
- Reach-by-reach discussions
- High-level long-term concepts (2100+)
- Focus primarily on coastal flood risk (as opposed to inland) in these workshops
- Iterative process
